Thompson, after being shot, entered no complaint.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Drowned in Lake at Yardley.</p> <p>Charles Anderson, aged 77 years, a carpenter by trade was found drowned in Lake Afton, at Yardley, Sunday afternoon about 3 30 o'clock by James Coulson, of Yardley. Anderson's hat was first noticed on the bank and then the broken ice in the lake attracted attention. Upon search being made the body of Anderson was found on the north side of the lake, near where the trolley makes a bend. The ground showed that he had made an attempt to get out, but was unable to do so.</p> <p>Anderson was last seen about 8 o'clock Saturday night. He was somewhat eccentric and lived on the farm of Arthur Riegler, just outside of Yardley. He was the son of the late James Anderson, of Lower Makefield, and is survived by a sister, Rachel, of Trenton, and several brothers, one, Watson Anderson, residing in Yardley.
