The liquor, it was ascertained from the testimony, was furnished to three Indian boys

James M. Bigley, agent for the Pennsylvania Aid Society, was called to the stand, who said that he had been told in Newtown that the boys would hang around the alley where Johnson, the colored man, lived, and in that way suspicion arose that Johnson was furnishing the goods
