

# ALFRED JERAULD CALLED BY DEATH

One of Ewing Township's Oldest  
Residents --- Justice for  
Many Years

TRENTON JUNCTION April 30  
'Squire Alfred Jerauld Jr, one of the  
oldest residents of Ewing Township,  
died yesterday afternoon at his resi-  
dence at Trenton Junction. Death was  
caused by heart trouble, with which  
the 'squire was affected during the past  
ten years.

'Squire Jerauld was born at Provi-  
dence, R I, June 6 1833. He was the  
son of the late Harriet and Alfred  
Jerauld. After his school education he  
entered the wool business at Provi-  
dence, R I but was forced to give this  
occupation up on account of ill health,  
in 1876 at which time he moved to  
Philadelphia and got a position with  
the Gleason-Williams Dye Company.

He was married to Miss Martha E  
White in 1877 at which time he moved  
to the farm now occupied by Fell &  
Roberts, on the Trenton branch of the  
Philadelphia and Reading Railway.  
During 1890 he and his wife moved into  
the house on the southwest corner of  
Ewing and Grand Avenues, Trenton  
Junction and lived there until two  
months ago, when they moved into the  
Force property opposite the railroad  
station, at Trenton Junction.

Mr Jerauld was Justice of the Peace  
of Ewing Township for the past thirty  
years. He was a veteran of the Civil  
War, and a member of Hiram Lodge  
No 9, F & A M, of Claremont N H.

He is survived by a widow, a sister,  
Miss Bessie Jerauld of Providence R  
I, and a brother, DeWitt P Jerauld  
of Harrisburg, Pa.

The funeral will be held at his late  
residence Monday afternoon at 2  
o'clock, under the direction of Poulson  
& Coleman.
