

#### **EMPLOYEE UPDATES**

#### Lower Makefield Police Department - Honoring Chief Ken Coluzzi After 48 Years of Service

Lower Makefield Chief of Police and former Philadelphia Homicide Commander, Ken Coluzzi, is calling it quits.

Coluzzi began his career in policing in Philadelphia in 1978 and rose through the ranks. For many years, he was prominent in the media, highlighting many violent crimes and murder cases. During his long career, he oversaw some of the city's highest profile investigations, such as the rape and brutal murder of Shannon Scheiber, the collapse of Pier34 Club Heat, the cold- blooded assassination of Philly Police Officer Charles Knox, and the 1991 Murder of Cigna Employee on the JFK Parkway by Hahnemann Hospital Psychiatrist Jean-Claude Pierre Hill, to name a few.

Some of Coluzzi's Homicide Unit duties were heading the Special Investigations Unit and Fugitive Squad. He was deputized as a United States Marshal for the apprehension of dangerous fugitives and later supervised the FBI Federal Fugitive Task Force.

During his career, he received numerous commendations including the prestigious award for bravery. He was also honored by the Chapel of the Four Chaplin's for his unbiased service to the community.

On October 9, 2000, Coluzzi was appointed Chief of Police of the Lower Makefield Police Department. As Chief, he reorganized the police department and was responsible for Lower Makefield achieving Pennsylvania State accreditation status. Shortly after his appointment, the September 11th terrorist attack occurred taking the lives of 18 Bucks County and 8 Lower Makefield residents. Coluzzi and his officers were instrumental working with all the family members affected by the attack, and particularly the family of Lower Makefield resident, Victor Saracini, pilot of the United flight 175, by providing security as well as assisting them in identifying their loved ones.

In 2015, Coluzzi introduced Narcan, the opioid reversal drug, to his police officers and pushed for the adoption and use of Naloxone by each police agency in Bucks County. Since then, his officers administered Narcan on many occasions and have saved 42 lives thus far in Lower Makefield and countless individuals have been saved across the county.

Ken Coluzzi will especially miss his interactions with the community and all the friends and supporters he has acquired over his 24 years as the Chief of Lower Makefield.


Deputy Chief Bob Lewis and his staff said the following about Coluzzi:

#### FIRE SERVICES

On December 17, 2024, Firefighters Michael Husla, Luke Martinez, and Frank Rotella completed the fall semester 192-hour Firefighter 1 national certification course instructed by the Bucks County Community College. These 3 members put in numerous hours beyond the course studying and practicing hands-on skills. We are extremely proud of these members and encourage them to continue to grow and learn in the fire service! We currently have members attending the spring semester Firefighter 1 course and look forward to them completing the course and continuing to serve the community.

The fire company responded to over 650 calls for service in 2024, varying from house fires, vehicle fires, hazardous conditions, and many other emergencies that the company members handled. This number of calls for service has grown over the years from the expanding growth our community is having. Community growth is great, but it also puts a toll on the emergency responders that protect the town. The fire company is always looking for residents in the community who might be interested in joining to reach out

#### **Electric Bicycles and Scooters Fire Safety Tips:**

Electric bicycles and electric scooters, or e-bikes and e-scooters, are more popular than ever. These devices provide riders with a lower-cost and environmentally friendly way to get around. However, unknown to many users, the batteries that power e-bikes and e-scooters have also been known to catch fire and cause explosions.

#### What are e-bikes?

E-bikes and e-scooters are technically known as "motorized micro mobility devices." They are powered by electricity, which is usually provided by a lithium-ion battery. E-bikes can have a motor that either fully propels the vehicle or assists the rider with pedaling.

#### Do e-bikes catch on fire?

Most e-bikes and e-scooters are powered by lithium-ion batteries. This is the same type of battery that powers many of today's electric vehicles, cell phones, laptops, and power tools. When lithium-ion batteries are damaged, they can overheat, catch on fire, and even lead to explosions. When fires occur, they also tend to burn very hot and can be difficult for firefighters to extinguish. E-bike and e-scooter battery fires have also been associated with faulty charging equipment, improper charging practices, and overloaded electrical circuits.

#### How often do fires occur?

While there are no national or international statistics on how often e-bikes or e-scooters catch on fire, it does happen with some regularity—and the numbers are rising. The New York City Fire Department (FDNY) has reported more than 200 such fires in 2022. These fires have led to multiple deaths and dozens of injuries. In 2019, the first year FDNY started tracking e-bike fires, only 13 were reported.



#### How can you stay safe?

There are a few ways to reduce the risk of fires involving e-bikes and e-scooters. First, if you are looking to buy one of these devices, only purchase ones that are listed by a nationally recognized testing lab and labeled accordingly. If you already own or use a device, don't continue to charge the battery once it's full, never use charging equipment that didn't come with your device, and stop using your device if the battery shows signs of damage, such as an unusual odor or change in color. If your device needs repairs, have them performed by a qualified professional.

Often called the silent killer, carbon monoxide is an invisible, odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely. In the home, heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel can be sources of carbon monoxide.

- O alarms should be installed in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home and in other locations where required by applicable laws, codes or standards. For the best protection, interconnect all CO alarms throughout the home. When one sounds, they all sound.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for placement and mounting height.
- ))) Choose a CO alarm that has the label of a recognized testing laboratory.
- Call your local fire department's non-emergency number to find out what number to call if the CO alarm sounds.
- >>> Test CO alarms at least once a month; replace them according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- ))) If the audible trouble signal sounds, check for low batteries. If the battery is low, replace it. If it still sounds, call the fire department.
- If the CO alarm sounds, immediately move to a fresh air location outdoors or by an open window or door. Make sure everyone inside the home is accounted for. Call for help from a fresh air location and stay there until emergency personnel.
- If you need to warm a vehicle, remove it from the garage immediately after starting it. Do not run a vehicle or other fueled engine or motor indoors, even if garage doors are open. Make sure the exhaust pipe of a running vehicle is not covered with snow.
- During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow build-up.
- A generator should be used in a well-ventilated location outdoors away from windows, doors and vent openings.
- ))) Gas or charcoal grills can produce CO only use outside.

#### HOME HEATING EQUIPMENT

Have fuel-burning heating equipment and chimneys inspected by a professional every year before cold weather sets in. When using a fireplace, open the flue for adequate ventilation. Never use your oven to heat your home.

#### **FACTS**

- (1) A person can be poisoned by a small amount of CO over a longer period of time or by a large amount of CO over a shorter amount of time.
- In 2005, U.S. fire departments responded to an estimated 61,100 non-fire CO incidents in which carbon monoxide was found, or an average of seven calls per hour.

#### **HOW TO AVOID A SCAM**

## FOUT SIGNS THAT IT'S A SCAM

Scammers PRETEND to be from an organization you know. Scammers often pretend to be contacting you on behalf of the government. They might use a real name, like the Social Security Administration, the IRS, or Medicare, or make up a name that sounds official. Some pretend to be from a business you know, like a utility company, a tech company, or even a charity asking for





donations. They use technology to change the phone number that appears on your caller ID. So the name and number you see might not be real.

- Scammers say there's a PROBLEM or a PRIZE. They might say you're in trouble with the government. Or you owe money. Or someone in your family had an emergency. Or that there's a virus on your computer. Some scammers say there's a problem with one of your accounts and that you need to verify some information. Others will lie and say you won money in a lottery or sweepstakes but have to pay a fee to get it.
- Scammers PRESSURE you to act immediately. Scammers want you to act before you have time to think. If you're on the phone, they might tell you not to hang up so you can't check out their story. They might threaten to arrest you, sue you, take away your driver's or business license, or deport you. They might say your computer is about to be corrupted.
- Scammers tell you to PAY in a specific way. They often insist that you pay by sending money through a money transfer company or by putting money on a gift card and then giving them the number on the back. Some will send you a check (that will later turn out to be fake), tell you to deposit it, and then send them money.

#### WHAT YOU CAN DO TO AVOID A SCAM

- Block unwanted calls and text messages. Take steps to block unwanted calls and to filter unwanted text messages.
- Don't give your personal or financial information in response to a request that you didn't expect. Legitimate organizations won't call, email, or text to ask for your personal information, such as your Social Security, bank account, or credit card numbers. If you get an email or text message from a company you do business with and you think it's real, it's still best not to click on any links. Instead, contact them using a website you know is trustworthy. Or look up their phone number. Don't call a number they gave you or the number from your caller ID.
- Resist the pressure to act immediately. Legitimate businesses will give you time to make a decision. Anyone who pressures you to pay or give them your personal information is a scammer.
- Know how scammers tell you to pay. Never pay someone who insists you pay with a gift card or by using a money transfer service. And never deposit a check and send money back to someone.
- Stop and talk to someone you trust. Before you do anything else, tell someone a friend, a family member, a neighbor what happened. Talking about it could help you realize it's a scam.

You have received this letter because your property is in an area that has been flooded several times. Our community is concerned about repetitive flooding and has an active program to help protect yourself and your property from future flooding.

Below are some things you can do:

- 1. Know Your Flood Risk.
- Find out the history and extent of past flooding in your area. Township staff can advise you as to whether a property is in a high-risk or moderate-to-low-risk area, the base flood elevation, and the mandatory flood insurance purchase requirements.
- You can learn about your flood risk by visiting the Lower Makefield Township Building to view the currently effective Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs), or by viewing the DFIRMs at FEMA Map Service Center: https://msc.fema.gov/portal/ home and entering the address of the property.
- Township staff can tell you about the causes of repetitive flooding, what the Township is doing about it, and what would be an appropriate flood protection level, or visit your property to discuss flood protection alternatives.
- 2. Prepare for Flooding by Doing the Following:
- Make sure your telephone number is listed with an emergency alert system for call notification in the event of an evacuation.

- Make a disaster response plan. See the FEMA website at https://www.ready.gov/plan for information about preparing your home and family for a disaster.
- Know how to shut off electricity and gas to your house when a flood comes.
  - Make a list of emergency numbers and identify a safe place to go to.
  - Safeguard possessions: Make a household inventory, take photos or videos and store at a higher level.
  - Put all insurance policies, valuable papers, medicine, etc. in a safe place, away from flood waters.
  - Collect and put cleaning supplies, cameras, waterproof boots, etc. in a handy place.
  - Get a copy of Repairing Your Flooded Home & other publications found on the Township website: https:// www.lmt.org/public-safety/delaware-river-flood-infoand-insurance/
- 3. Consider Some Permanent Flood Protection Measures.
- Mark your fuse or breaker box to show the circuits to the floodable areas. Turning off the power to the basement before a flood can reduce property damage & save lives.
- Consider elevating your house above flood levels.
- Check your building for water entry points, such as basement windows, the basement stairwell, doors, and dryer vents.
   These can be protected with low walls or temporary shields.

- Install a floor drain plug, standpipe, overhead sewer, or sewer backup valve to prevent sewer backup flooding.
- More information can be found at FEMA's website www.ready. gov/floods.
- Note that some flood protection measures may need a building permit, and others may not be safe for your type of building, so be sure to talk to the Building Department
- 4. Talk to the Township about Financial Assistance
- There are a variety of funding sources to help mitigate floodprone properties, including Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP), Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA), Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC). If certain criteria are met, most of the FEMA grants provide 75% of the cost of the project. The owner is expected to fund the remaining 25%.
- Find out more about funding programs that are appropriate for your situation by visiting the website: http://www.fema. gov/hazard-mitigation-assistance
- Residents may be eligible for Increased Cost of Compliance (ICC) assistance, which is a resource for flood insurance policyholders who need additional help rebuilding after a flood.
- 5. Get a flood insurance policy:
- Flood insurance policy will help pay for repairs after a flood and, in some cases, help pay for the costs of elevating a substantially damaged building.
- Homeowners insurance policies do not cover damage from flood. Because our community participates in the National Flood Insurance Program, you can purchase a separate flood insurance policy. This insurance is backed by the Federal government and is available to everyone, even properties that have been flooded. Since our community participates in the Community Rating System, you will receive a 15% reduction in the insurance premium.
- Don't wait to buy flood insurance protection. In most cases, there is a 30-day waiting period before the National Flood Insurance Program coverage takes effect.
- Policies are available for rental properties.
- You can use the new Direct-to-Consumer Flood Insurance Quote Tool to get a quote in 10 minutes or less at: https:// www.floodsmart.gov/policy-quote
- Contact your insurance agent for more information on rates and coverage.
- 6. Construction and alteration projects in the floodplain MAY trigger the need for permits not normally issued to properties outside of the floodplain. Call us to determine if permits are necessary for your project.






